New Location and a Fresh Spin for Belgravia School's Annual Fun Auction

The school's premier fundraiser, re-titled the Belgravia Gala, takes place at the Art Gallery of Alberta on April 21, 2012. The event features a live auction, dance and raffle, catered by the AGA's Zinc. Guests can bid on unique experiences, dance to today's hottest tunes (and a few from the past), and buy raffle tickets to enter raffles for the prizes of their choice, such as golf and travel packages, fine wine, restaurant certificates, and much, much more.

All proceeds go to fund learning opportunities at Belgravia Elementary School. This year, the focus is on making a major investment in the school's technology, to upgrade the school's few - and ageing - desktop computers, expand SmartBoards to every classroom, and purchase wireless computers to make full use of the Wi-Fi installation paid for by previous fundraisers.

The goal is to put the school on solid ground for today and the future, by offering a well-rounded education fit for the modern world. Demographics and strong community support has enabled Belgravia School to flourish after being put on the list for possible school closure in 2007, but continued investment in our neighbourhood school is needed. Matching provincial grants are expected to double available funds.

Previous events have been major successes, thanks to hard-working volunteers, extremely generous donors and amazing school spirit from current and alumni families. Funds have paid for artists in residence; drama [Continued on Page 4...]





South Campus Green & Gold Community Garden

The volunteer gardeners at the Green & Gold Community garden, on the University of Alberta South Campus, are making plans for our fourth gardening season.

The garden is an initiative of the University's School of Public Health and Faculty of Agricultural, Life and Environmental Sciences. Volunteers operate

the garden and all of their time, and most of the seeds, plants and equipment used are donated.

The vegetables, herbs and flowers are "spray-free" (no pesticides or artificial fertilizers are used). Anyone is welcome to 'purchase' their vegetables at the garden and every penny of the money raised – that's 100% – goes to the **Tubahumurize Association**, a non-profit organization in Rwanda that provides socially and economically marginalized women with vocational training, counselling, life-skills coaching, health care education, and opportunities for sustainable income generating activities. Most individuals who benefit from Tubahumurize are genocide survivors and many are widows or orphans, HIV infected, and survivors of physical and sexual violence. Last year the garden raised over \$22,000 for the Tubahumurize project.



We are now gearing up for the 2012 gardening season, and are looking for new volunteers to help with the garden. Both novice & experienced gardeners are welcome. Belgravia Stories: The Museum That Jack Francis Built


"I couldn't just let it go to the junk yard!" That's one of Jack Francis's favourite phrases. What's neat is that he's managed to turn a personal fascination with artifacts into a cool little museum on our doorsteps.

Jack is bursting with stories. He moved into the area in 1945, when just a few houses on the north side of 74th Avenue bordered what was then called the "Chinaman's Garden". There was no Belgravia Road, no Fox Drive – only the tracks of the Toonerville Trolley on 76th Avenue bisecting the rich pasture land that topped the banks of the North Saskatchewan River and rolled gently to the University Farm. And the farm is where Jack lived, briefly in 1945 then for more than 40 years after returning in 1949.

So why did a farm boy from Tofield move to a city farm? The second of five boys, Jack knew there wasn't room for all of them to stay on the family homestead. So when someone from the Agriculture faculty, after meeting Jack at bull sales, asked if he'd like to work with cattle here, Jack jumped at the chance.

"After moving here in 1949, I lived in the Pavilion for four years, until I got married," Jack recalls. "There were three rooms upstairs. Single men would stay there and eat at the homes of other employees." The Pavilion – then used for classroom work – is still there, set back from the road just west of the new GO Centre.

After marrying in 1953, Jack and his bride Joyce moved to House #3 on the [Continued on next page...]

[...continued from previous] farm. There they raised a son and daughter, not moving again until 1986. They lived in House #5 until 1991, then relocated to their 73rd Avenue bungalow in Belgravia when Jack "retired".

Where Jack's concerned, retirement is a relative thing. With a front row seat to the development in this area and a passion for preserving history, Jack has amassed a remarkable collection of items from the farm and personal donations. In 2001, the Agriculture faculty gave Jack the use of part of the original 1921 Horse Barn to display his artifacts. When construction necessitated relocating the Horse Barn in 2010, the collection was moved to the old Dairy Barn, across the road from the Pavilion.

On a recent Saturday morning, dressed in a black Stetson and Western-style blue denim jacket, Jack proudly showed off items as fascinating and diverse as a set of elk antlers in full velvet, a foot operated seed sorter, antique veterinary equipment, photos of prize-winning livestock from the earliest days of the Agriculture faculty, a very early Compaq portable computer, a 1960s-era x-ray machine, a beautifully restored wood stove and a World War II practice bomb. Each has a story, and Jack knows them all.

"Belgravia Green" Net Zero Project Grand Opening

Effect Home Builders


An innovative project under construction in Edmonton's Belgravia district is proving there is more than one path to sustainability when it comes to housing design.

The development, known as Belgravia Green, consists of three homes built side-by-side along a quiet, tree-lined street in the University-area neighbourhood. The 1500-square-foot middle house, at 11536-74 Avenue, is a show home for Effect Home Builders, an Edmonton company known for its energy efficient houses. Flanking it on either side

are two privately owned custom homes. All three are designed to approach or achieve net-zero energy status, where a house produces as much energy throughout the year as it consumes.

"Over the years we've been continually pushing the envelope, building homes that are more and more energy efficient. Belgravia Green brings together a lot of the experience we've gathered over the years into one project," says Les Wold, the company's managing partner.

"One of the big things we've learned is that there are multiple ways to approach building energy efficient homes. That is what we really like about this project. There are three different homes and they are all reaching towards the same goal, but approaching it with different considerations and different technologies."



Collaboration was key to pulling together the many disparate elements into a cohesive whole, says Wold. Homeowners, local experts and Effect's team met regularly to hammer out the best way to balance energy efficiency goals with the characteristics of the building sites, the needs of the owners, and the budgets they were working with. "Everybody had their laptops and we were bouncing ideas back and forth and really honing in on what was going to be best for the project," explains Wold.

Central to the discussion was the building envelope, which is the foundation of any energy efficient design. All three houses are built to be airtight, with highly efficient heat-recovery ventilation systems used to exchange stale indoor air with fresh outdoor air.

[...continued from previous] centimetres of polystyrene under the basement slab to reduce heat loss, as well as three-paned windows filled with high R-value argon gas and 3 coats of Low Emissivity film. Two of the houses feature a 30 cm Nascor wall system that uses engineered wood and expanded polystyrene to achieve an insulation value of R-42, while the third uses 41 cm double stud wood frame to get to R-56.

The houses all have different heating systems, utilizing electric baseboard, geothermal, and air-source heat pump technologies. They are also designed to take advantage of sunlight to passively warm the house. The show home, for example, has a whole bank of windows on the south-facing wall and a concrete main floor that absorbs the sun's heat and then slowly radiates it to supply 32% of yearly heating for the home.

Sunlight also supplies the electricity the show home needs to run its heating system, lights and appliances and to heat its hot water tanks via a 12 kW solar electric system installed this summer. The modules are tied into Edmonton's electricity distribution system, allowing the house to feed any excess output onto the grid and draw from it when the solar panels aren't producing enough to meet the home's demand.

The other two homes at Belgravia Green are also set up to install solar systems, although the decision about when has yet to be made. Flexibility is deliberately built into the design using "the simple tweak of having a conduit run from the mechanical room up to the roof" to make it easy for homeowners to add the modules when their budgets allow, says Wold.

Solar generation is only one part of the additional cost incurred when building net-zero. Wold estimates the cost is about 7-8% more than a standard house to get these homes to net-zero ready, which includes everything but the solar component. "It's manageable, and we're constantly working to keep the cost down."

There is little doubt that interest in the kind of homes being built at Belgravia Green is growing, says Wold. Effect is expecting large crowds at the grand opening on March 10th and 11th, from noon-4 p.m. The owners of the Belgravia Green's easternmost house, currently live next to the site and see that interest every day as passersby stop to check out the project. "It's very clear to us that there is an appetite for this that's just on the brink of exploding."


