

Meet Our Centenarian Neighbour: Leonard Allbon

Len was born on February 28, 1921 in Sydenham, England. As a youngster, he loved going to school, helping his mom and dad run their British Candy Shop (can you imagine having parents who owned a candy business?) and visiting his cousins in Southend-on-Sea.

Len joined the Royal Air Force (RAF) when he was 18. He attended the Royal Air Force College before being appointed to the Air/Sea Rescue Department first as a Private moving on to the rank of Captain. As a communications expert (which he learned in the London bunkers alongside Sir Winston Churchill), a key task for him was to identify and locate enemy forces that were a threat to England. His WWII experience took him to Italy as well. As part of the Air Forces' mobile operations to "Save the Children" his battalion rescued orphaned and injured children throughout Italy. Leonard's recorded story of these experiences can be found in The Memory Project (https://www.thememoryproject.com)

Len was 25 years old when he was released from the RAF. With the RAF offering veterans re-education opportunities,



Len's work with the injured children in Italy piqued his interest in occupational therapy. He attended the London School of Occupational Therapy and graduated in 1950. While pursuing a career in helping the injured regain functional abilities in their everyday and working lives, he met a nurse named Margaret at Bootham Park Hospital in York. They married in 1957.

In 1959, Len applied for and was hired by the U of A School of Physical Therapy to develop the occupational therapy program. Len and Margaret arrived by plane in January 1960 with their 2-year-old daughter, Clare. Their Austin Mini packed with all their belongings had been shipped and then put on a train to Edmonton. By the time Hilary was born in 1962 and Jack in 1967 no doubt the family had outgrown their Austin Mini.

After a lot of hard work at the U of A and saving their money, in 1969 Len and Margaret bought the Belgravia home where Len still lives today with Hilary. They embraced all that came along as Edmonton grew as a city becoming Citadel Theatre season ticket holders when it opened in 1965; visiting the Provincial Museum when it opened in 1967; enjoying the Edmonton Valley Zoo; supporting the building of the Commonwealth Stadium in 1978; cheering for the Edmonton football and hockey teams; attending the Edmonton International Street Performers Festivals that began in 1985, the 1996 World Figure Skating Championships (and meeting Elvis Stojko), and the first Grand Prix at the downtown airport in 2005. The whole family took a keen interest in all that was making Edmonton a great city.

Len's community contributions include 15 years with the 504 Air Cadets Squadron at the 700 Wing eventually as Commanding Officer (with several of his air cadets becoming pilots for Air Canada and Ward Air) and many years with the Edmonton Referee Association as a referee for junior games during soccer season. His interests have been varied and his energy for being involved is obvious. Even after retiring from the U of A, Len took a job as a researcher for the members of the Alberta Legislature.

To Len, life has settled into a daily routine in the last 20 years; being old "means you can sleep when you want, eat when you want, read whatever you want, and not fuss anymore about working or taking care of anyone but yourself and your wife. I have seen many things throughout my life, but am happiest when I see my children and my grandchildren. I hope to live to be 110, because then I will have lived as a retired gentleman longer than I worked!"

Sustainability Update - Air Monitor Installed at the Hall

There is so much in the news these days about air quality and air pollution, and you may have seen the Air Quality Health Index (AQHI) as a part of the weather forecast. But, have you ever wondered about the quality of the air we are breathing in our neighbourhood? Well, now you can find out! We are excited to announce that the BCL hall is now a host site for an air monitor! This is part of an initiative organized by Alberta Capital Airshed - the air monitor was installed in December and will be in place for 1-2 years. Next time you pass by the hall, see if you can spot it - it is quite small (about the size of a mug) and is installed on one of the wooden poles by the skating rink!

The Alberta Capital Airshed (ACA) is one of 10 not-for-profit Airshed organizations in Alberta, responsible for monitoring and reporting on the ambient (outdoor) air quality. Alongside our partners at Alberta Environment and Parks, who manage a network of 7 stations, Alberta's Airsheds operate 85 permanent stations, several portable stations and hundreds of micro sensors and passive monitoring sites.

Our primary mandate is to monitor the air quality and report to stakeholders, including communities. We stream live air quality data on our website, create data analysis and trends reports, and provide data necessary for the Air Quality Health Index, a number between 1 and 10 that is being used widely to advise people of the current and forecasted air quality. For those that use Twitter, you will see that the ACA tweets out a daily forecast for Edmonton and surrounding communities every day at 8 AM (@yegairshed).

ACA and the other Airsheds also disseminate information and engage communities on air quality and the importance of clean air. We are a multi-stakeholder organization that is funded by grants and our members, which include municipalities, community groups, health agencies, industry, provincial government, academia, and others.

One of our newest initiatives is to build out a network of micro sensors that monitor fine particulate matter. In Edmonton, we are doing this through partnerships with the City of Edmonton Rec Centres, Community Leagues, and Schools. Fine particulate matter, or $PM_{2.5}$, is a term for small particles that are found in the air. $PM_{2.5}$ comes from a variety of sources including road dust, engine combustion, fires, building heating, and many more, and contain various chemical compositions. For human health, $PM_{2.5}$ is of growing concern and "has been shown in a large number of studies to be strongly associated with cardiovascular and respiratory mortality and morbidity endpoints" (Health Canada), and is often now used as an indicator for overall air quality.


For Belgravia, we are using a Purple Air sensor. It will appear on our website's monitoring map, alongside live data from other sites, and also at www.purpleair.com where it can be compared with sites around the world. The map data layer setting at the bottom left-hand side can be changed to 'Canadian AQHI'. While it is not actually a true representation of AQHI (as it is only monitoring for $PM_{2.5}$, and not O_3 and NO_x that are used in the official AQHI calculation) it allows for an easy interface for Canadian users.

The value of the data collected goes beyond just a quick glance of comparable sensors. The ACA uses all of data collected for our reports on the Airshed (greater Edmonton) and can help alert us, and others, to potential issues within a neighbourhood that may require investigation or expanded monitoring. As a host site, the ACA will provide future data reports, comparing Belgravia with other neighbourhoods in the Edmonton area.

History of Belgravia - First Edition

The development of the McKernan and Belgravia neighbourhoods has been largely influenced by surrounding development, most notably that related to the University of Alberta, founded in 1908, and the University Farm, established in the 1930s. Government, medical and university facilities built in the area became important employment and activity centres for residents of these neighbourhoods.

In 1878 Robert and Sara McKernan settled south of the North Saskatchewan River and soon built a farmhouse on the site of the present-day McKernan School. A marshy pond nearby was called McKernan Lake and eventually became a popular recreation place in both summer and winter.

Belgravia was named after a fashionable residential section of 19th century London, England. It was originally subdivided before 1914 but few homes were built in this period.

Belgravia is on Treaty Six territory and as such was for ages the preserve of First Nations, especially Cree. The main topographic elements of Belgravia have not changed since that time - the nearby river valley, the Belgravia coulee (or draw) that carried a stream from the Belgravia and U of A Farm uplands to the river, and nearby Whitemud Creek.

History of Belgravia - First Edition (continued)



Northeast of Belgravia, the town of Strathcona sprung up at the end of the Calgary & Edmonton Railway (which had arrived in 1891). Strathcona became a city (in 1907) and its boundaries were extended to take in Belgravia. But it was only after the cities of Strathcona and Edmonton (located across the North Saskatchewan River) amalgamated in 1912 that any serious suburban settlement began.

Robert Tegler (of Tegler Building fame) put Belgravia lots on the market in 1912, and envisioned quick sales and quick profits. But, a general economic slump tied to WWI slowed sales. Even after the war ended and soldiers came home, Alberta, still with a mostly-agricultural economy, was fairly stagnant. It would not be until the brink of the Great Depression that Edmonton would achieve the population level that it had had prior to WWI.

After the Depression hit, many people fled Edmonton to eke out self-sufficient back-to-the-land existences outside the struggling money economy staggering along in the cities. Belgravia was part of this demographic process. Some people fled to Belgravia and others fled even further away from suburban demands.

The McKernan District Community League was founded in 1932. Its territory included Belgravia, which would not have its own community league until 20 years later. The two communities, softly-divided by a boundary without meaning on the ground, would share concerns and victories through time thereafter.

A second "Great War" followed the Depression. Many Belgravians were involved in the war effort, some in uniform, some in war industries and on the home front, others keeping the home fires burning. The staggering volume of production of war materiel led to high employment and many women joined the workforce.

Off to dinner we go in the spring.


