Get Involved

WHY WE NEED BLOCK CONNECTORS

Block Connectors are central to the Abundant Community framework. They connect with their neighbours (about 20 households in a typical block, building floor or cul-de-sac). They introduce themselves as a Point person, Party person and Listener for their block. Residents then slowly (more often than quickly!) get to know each other by the initiatives taken by the connector. Neighbours knowing each other contributes to a culture of care and connection, and a sense of belonging and inclusion.

The Point person keeps neighbours updated about things happening the block, and helps spread info about neighbourhood events. They can make introductions and might put together a contact list or as we often do here in Belgravia, a block map for their neighbours.

The Party person takes initiative for one or two social gatherings per year for their block. The Listener takes note of what their neighbours express about interests and the skills they might want to share with neighbours.

While there are around 28 Block Connectors in Belgravia, about 16 blocks are without Connectors. If you want to get to know more neighbours and help create a neighbourly vibe, you'd be in good company!

The next gathering for Belgravia Block Connectors and anyone interested in the initiative will be a hot apple cider fall social in mid-Oct.

Marion and Bob paused to celebrate Bob's birthday this past summer

Marion Brenner and Bob Gardner moved into their house on 72nd Avenue in 2008. Only recently have they had time to really enjoy the community life around them. In fact, these days their front yard, which Bob describes as a community effort, might be mistaken for Belgravia's newest garden café – complete with little red chairs. This Edmonton-raised couple has had busy careers as high school teachers. Marion in Drama and Bob in Social studies. But during the pandemic they spent more time at home. That's when they took up gardening. They started small by creating a few curbside flower beds. Kids on the block soon showed up to help, and now both flowers and neighbour relations are flourishing.

During her career, Marion worked at six different schools in addition to being a director, singer, and writer of no less than 15 theatre plays. During the pandemic, Marion realized how much time she had spent commuting. She also felt that "I hardly knew my neighbours, and wanted to do more for and in my own community". So, this past summer Marion ran 4 weeks of drama classes for kids at the BCL Hall. Kids loved it and families and friends enjoyed the resulting shows. Marion will continue with a Drama Academy for kids this fall. It turns out there is a large interest in the performing arts in Belgravia, and we just have the right person here to teach us.

Bob, too, is delighted to live in Belgravia. "It is like living in a small town, without actually living in a small town". Both Bob and Marion like city life and are strong supporters of local cafes and restaurants. They prefer traveling to cities, especially in Europe. Bob has been all over the U.S with the excuse of watching baseball games. These days he is an Edmonton Elks season pass holder. When the couple are not out and about, they enjoy the fact that 72nd Avenue is a constant play street and that kids often hang out in their front yard. "Just as we started to have more time, the kids on this street had grown up enough to be out playing more. We like that it is lively and that the kids here interact not just with other kids but also with us adults".

Bob recently retired from his long teaching career at Harry Ainlay, Strathcona and McNally high schools. He maintains strong ties to the University of Alberta, where he hung out when he was younger at the then new and unique Hub Mall with his friends and later earned two degrees in Education. Bob will soon feature in a podcast out of the U of A, drawing from a rich teaching career that also included writing textbooks and curriculum and travelling to Finland for teaching partnerships. He also enjoys exploring all corners of Edmonton on his bike, something he used to do a lot as a kid and young adult, but was too busy to do during his working years. Feature: Mood Café Thriving at Two Years

It takes a lot of optimism to open a neighbourhood cafe and pastry shop in the midst of a pandemic when many businesses are struggling. But Mood Café owner Ahmed (Ed) Daoud has more experience and credentials than most. Trained in Paris, he has opened several successful cafés (including Le Petit Paris in Edmonton), baked for Queen Elizabeth and a prime minister, and led multiple teams to Gold wins in international culinary competitions in Europe and Asia. He ran the pastry program at SAIT for two years, where all his graduating students were quickly employed. In the world of pastry chefs, Ed is Canada's Olympic Gold champion.

How did Belgravia get so lucky? Ed already owned the building and when it became vacant, he and his family saw an opportunity. His four children and wife all support the business, with son Ali working as manager. His goal is to cater to every type of customer and "bring people the quality they deserve." From croissants to eclairs to beautiful single serving cakes and tarts, there's something for everyone. The only limitation is the kitchen size.

After two years of operation, Ed says his vision is being realized. "The community has been so welcoming and supportive," he says. "When we opened, people brought us gifts. I remember a grandmother coming by with her granddaughter to bring us a flower. Now we know many of our customers by name." Ed and his wife love the community so much they bought a house in Belgravia last year. "I regret that I didn't move to this beautiful neighbourhood earlier," he says.

Feature: Harry Potter Avenue

When I moved to Belgravia 2 years ago, an early adventure was a stroll down 75th avenue, east of 118th street. I immediately dubbed it the 'Harry Potter avenue'. I felt I was in a magic forest!

This avenue is unusual in Belgravia. Besides the usual American elm and green ash trees, the City planted basswood (linden or lime) trees, back in the 1950s. (For fun, google 'images *Tilia europaea'*). They often have 'epicormic shoots', which are stems and leaves that emerge from the bottom and side of the tree trunk. This growth in trees is often associated with stress, and I suspect the local stress was from drought. Certainly, since the huge El Nino event of 1998 we have seen much heat and dryness.


So the lower trunks sprout green stems every year, and then property owners (or the City) trim them off. Over time, this widens the lower trunk while the top of the tree is still narrow, producing a magical 'wine bottle' shape. You can see this effect in the basswood at 11611 - 75th Ave. Here's a fun project for an afternoon stroll this fall and winter: which of the basswood trees on 75th Avenue do you find the most interesting? The most beautiful? Basswood is well loved in Europe. My friends from Belarus delight in gathering the delicious-smelling flowers in July and drying them for herbal tea. Bees love these flowers too!

Masting: is the production of many seeds by a plant, every certain number of years, in regional synchrony with other plants of the same species. 2022 has been a 'mast year' for some conifers. Biologists suggest that the heat last summer (2021) was the impetus for the massive flowering we saw here in both white and blue spruce. Masting is a clever strategy by trees to increase the survival of future generations. The trees produce so many seeds that it's impossible for them all to be consumed by squirrels, birds, mice, etc. And this intense flowering (remember the heavy clouds of yellow pollen from the spruce this spring?) occurs across a wide geographic area. After the pollen cones finish in spring, the female seed cones develop. Just check the tops of

spruce trees (and all over the cedar trees) for massive amounts of cones. Some creatures are being very well fed on the cones, so expect a bumper crop in 2023 of both squirrels and red-breasted nuthatches.

Late Leaf Colouring: Last year on September 25th, in this area, the elms were already 80% yellow with many fallen leaves. This year on September 23rd, they are on average, about 30% yellow. Last year on Sept 22nd the sarsaparilla plants (*Aralia*) along the river valley forest trails, were brown and faded – but this year many plants are still green. Why the late colouring? There is some evidence that leaves have a certain life span. This year the spring stayed cold for a long while; the leaves got a late start and now seem to be lasting longer than usual.

Help your trees! To ensure your trees continue to thrive after our very dry summer, please soak the area around their 'drip line' with a few inches of water, several times before freeze up. If you find trees fascinating, I highly recommend the book *Trees in Canada* by J.L. Farrar.



Feature: Into the Garden

SAVING SEED - THE TIME IS NOW!

By the time you are reading this, our harvest at the Green and Gold Garden will be swiftly winding down. We had a brilliant onion crop this year, bountiful beets and potatoes, great greens and squash and, for the first time ever, Shark's Fin Melon – a glorious, delicious vigorous vine vegetable that we trialed and will grow again! Naturally all of these started from some sort of seed – so here are some simple money saving ways you can save common seeds from some of your favourite vegetables and flowers.

Tomatoes: these are fun to save. It is best if you know the origin of that tasty tomato you loved so much. Heirloom varieties grow true to seed (predictable). Choose your biggest and best candidate. Cut open and scrape out the seeds which will have some gel attached. Soak in a glass of water until the water is a bit cloudy looking (doesn't take long). The cloudy look indicates the beginning of fermentation of the gel. Dump the cloudy water and seeds through a fine mesh strainer and rinse well under tap. You'll have cute clean little light-coloured seeds.

Lay then out to dry on a piece of waxed paper (not paper towel...they will stick). Once dry, remove from waxed paper and store in a paper envelope. Label and date. Keep in dark dry place (maybe in your Seed Shoe Box). Tomato seeds heroically remain viable for over 5-10 years! If you're unsure about the age of your seed, plan to plant an extra 20%. If you don't know but want to try to grow that unidentifiable tasty store bought tomato anyway, Just do it. It will be an adventure.

Beans and peas: Let them dry on the vine if still possible. The pods will be pale and withered. Delete the pod part. Put into envelopes. Always label and date All Your Seeds. You *know* you will forget!

Flowers: Easy ones are calendula, marigolds, lupins and cosmos. All of these will be forming seed heads by now. Let the heads dry on the plants and clip off into a container. mature seeds

will easily separate from the dried flowers/seed cases so compost the chaff and store in a paper envelope with label and date. Most of these last at least a couple of years. Poppy heads are easy too; just shake out the tiny seeds into a clean container right out of their little salt shaker head!

Onions and leeks: Time is not on your side. These are some of the most short-lived seeds and are typically viable only for One Year. The Green and Gold Garden volunteers discovered this the hard way a few years ago, and suffered the loss of zero germination for an entire crop, necessitating costly purchase of greenhouse seedlings! If you are brave enough to save seed from your favourite onion head, be warned. The onion family is programmed to age very quickly. You may have to buy fresh new seed for these.

Store bought seeds are steadily increasing in price and decreasing in volume of product per package, so a little human energy spent gathering and saving one's own little seed crop pays dividends. Happy seed saving and many blessings for a good future garden!
